Regular Meeting
February 9, 2021**

The Town Board of the Town of Chester convened at the Town of Chester Municipal Center, 6307 State Route 9, Chestertown, New York, at 7:00 pm.

Roll Call: Supervisor Craig Leggett, Karen DuRose, Mike Packer, Larry Turcotte, Chris Aiken, Deputy Supervisor Marion Eagan and Attorney for the Town, Mark Schachner (via Zoom).

Regular Meeting:

Supervisor Leggett opened the Regular Town Board Meeting at 7:01 pm with Councilwoman DuRose leading the Pledge of Allegiance.

Parking on Theriot Avenue Public Hearing:

Supervisor Leggett opened the Public Hearing on the Proposed Local Law Amending Local Law No. 3 of 2005 Restricting Parking on Theriot Avenue in the Town of Chester at 7:02 pm by reading the proposed Local Law:

**A LOCAL LAW AMENDING LOCAL LAW NO. 3 OF 2005
RESTRICTING PARKING ON THERIOT AVENUE
IN THE TOWN OF CHESTER**

ARTICLE 1. The purpose of this Local Law is to amend Local Law No. 3 of 2005 restricting parking on Theriot Avenue in the Town of Chester to provide for the public safety by prohibiting parking of vehicles in certain locations where they are likely to interfere with safe travel along narrow roadways. It is adopted pursuant to New York Vehicle and Traffic Law §1660(a)(18) and Municipal Home Rule Law §10.

ARTICLE 2. Article 2 of Local Law No. 3 of 2005 is amended to read as follows:

Article 2. It shall be unlawful to park any vehicle on the north side and/or the south side of Theriot Avenue in the Town of Chester.

ARTICLE 3. All other terms and conditions of Local Law No. 3 of 2005 not specifically amended by this Local Law shall remain in full force and effect.

ARTICLE 4. This Local Law shall take effect upon filing by the office of the New York State Secretary of State.

Supervisor Leggett asked if there was anyone from the public wishing to speak to this Local Law Amendment.

Hearing none.

Supervisor Leggett closed the Public Hearing on the proposed Local Law Amending Local Law No. 3 of 2005 Restricting Parking on Theriot Avenue in the Town of Chester at 7:03 pm.

Town Board Reports:

Mr. Turcotte worked on the software for the Transfer Station, checked in with Jeremy Little in the Zoning Office, looked over the Loon Lake Local Laws revisions, and started looking into what the Town may or may not own on Riverside Drive.

Mrs. DuRose attended the Planning Board and Zoning Board Meetings via Zoom, spoke with the Town of Horicon about naming the Glendale Bridge, and fielded various phone calls from residences.

Mr. Packer repaired one of the circulator on the boiler in the basement of the Town Hall and has been hanging out at the Transfer Station watching to see how things flow.

Mr. Aiken spoke to people around Town about general business.

Supervisor Leggett reported the following:

- Went to the old Pottersville School to look at the auditorium seating, which Mr. McKenna is willing to donate. Mr. Packer asked if we had to take the frame and everything. Supervisor Leggett said that we do because the frames are different than the ones we have.
- The boiler inspection was done.
- Spoke with Warren County EDC, who is the manager for the grant for the Brownfield Environmental Assessment that is happening at Riverside, where they are still pulling up data from the monitoring wells.
- Working on tallying up the Dump from last year.

- Attended by Zoom the National Association of Counties, the New York State Association of Counties, and the Common Ground Alliance Meetings.
- Thanked Dr. Rugge and the Helper's Fund for meeting the needs of the people.

Lynn Thomas said that the Library Board of Trustees received a surprise gift of property last fall and they closed on selling it today. Mrs. DuRose thanked Lynn for a great job. Lynn thanked everyone for their help. Supervisor Leggett congratulated Lynn.

RESOLUTION NO. 28 OF 2021: APPROVE LOCAL LAW NO. 1 OF 2021

WHEREAS, Local Law No. 3 of 2005 prohibited parking on the south side of Theriot avenue in the Town of Chester, and

WHEREAS, the Town wishes to amend Local Law No. 3 of 2005 to include a no parking restriction on the north side and/or the south side of Theriot Avenue in the Town of Chester,

BE IT RESOLVED, the Town Board approves Local Law No. 1 of 2021, amending the parking restrictions on Theriot Avenue.

On a motion by Mr. Aiken, seconded by Mr. Packer, Resolution No. 28 of 2021 was **ADOPTED**.

RESOLUTION NO. 29 OF 2021: ACCEPT THE RESIGNATION OF SHARON BERG, TOWN OF CHESTER PUBLIC LIBRARY CLERK

WHEREAS, on December 28, 2020 Sharon Berg submitted a letter of resignation as Clerk to the Town of Chester Public Library, and

WHEREAS, Sharon Berg had worked for the Town of Chester Library for 18 years and will be greatly missed as she was an asset not only to the Town, but also to the Library, and

WHEREAS, the resignation letter stated effective December 31, 2020 would be her last day,

BE IT RESOLVED, the Town Board accepts the resignation of Sharon Berg, Town of Chester Public Library Clerk.

Atateka Drive Speed Reduction:

Supervisor Leggett said he received a phone call from Greg Boggia who operates Circle B Ranch about the speed limit on Atateka Drive. The Ranch offers trail rides and carriage rides and he has several incidences over the last year and has asked for a speed reduction.

Mr. Schachner commented that the bicycling community will be in favor of the speed reduction.

RESOLUTION NO. 30 OF 2021: AUTHORIZE SUPERVISOR TO APPLY TO WARREN COUNTY DPW AND NYS DOT FOR SPEED REDUCTION ON ATATEKA DRIVE

WHEREAS, the Town Supervisor received a request from a business on Atateka Drive to limit the speed to 45 mph in the area of the business, and

WHEREAS, due to the nature of the business and the sharp bend in the road at that location, it has become a hazard to the public, business, and trail horses, and horse drawn carriages, and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of public safety to reduce the speed limit between 116 Atateka Drive to 477-478 Atateka Drive,

BE IT RESOLVED, the Town Board authorizes the Town Supervisor to apply to Warren County DPW and NYS DOT for speed reduction to 45 mph between 116 Atateka Drive to 477-478 Atateka Drive.

On a motion by Mr. Aiken, seconded by Mrs. DuRose, Resolution No. 30 of 2021 was **ADOPTED**.

WHEREAS, the Pottersville Water District requires upgrades to its water system, which will require engineering services, and

WHEREAS, Warren County Planning has agreed to apply for funding through the Office of Community Renewal Community Development Block Grant to cover the cost of the engineering services for rehabilitation of the Pottersville Water District water lines,

BE IT RESOLVED, the Town Board authorizes Warren County Planning to submit an Application to the Office of Community Renewal Community Development Block Grant to cover the cost of the engineering services for rehabilitation of the Pottersville Water District water lines.

Loon Lake Local Law Amendment:

Supervisor Leggett read the proposed resolution:

WHEREAS, discussions between the Town Board and the Loon Lake Park District Association have resulted in several recommendations that will improve the safety and enjoyment of Loon Lake,

BE IT RESOLVED, the Town Board authorizes the Town Clerk to advertise for a public hearing and sets a public hearing for the Proposed Lake Local Law to be held on Tuesday, March 9, 2021 at 7 pm.

Mark Schachner, Attorney for the Town said that he emailed Craig a copy of the Draft Local Law before the meeting.

Supervisor Leggett asked if it was on the 2011 or the 1996 Local Law.

Mr. Schachner replied that the 1996 was all about personal watercraft and jet skis, so unless the Town Board feels otherwise you could just leave that one alone. So the draft local law would be a new law that would supersede the one from 2011 if you adopt the one being proposed.

Supervisor Leggett said they would move on while the Clerk made copies.

Loon Lake Local Law Amendment Resumed:

Mr. Schachner pointed out the changes for the Local Law from 2011. Changed the title to be a little more general, the purpose and authority are generalized, and sections 3, 4 and 6 are new. Mark recommends changing “in” to “on” in the Title and in Section 2, as well as defining “recreating” in section 4.

A LOCAL LAW REGULATING THE OPERATION OF VESSELS IN LOON LAKE

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CHESTER TOWN BOARD AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Purpose and Authority. The purpose of this Local Law is to regulate the operation of vessels in Loon Lake in the Town of Chester. It is adopted pursuant to Municipal Home Rule Law §10.

Section 2. Regulation of Vessel Speed in Certain Areas. No vessel shall be operated at a speed exceeding five (5) miles per hour in the waters of Loon Lake in the Town of Chester within the area shaded as indicated for "5 MPH SPEED ZONE" in the key shown on the attached map entitled "Loon Lake Proposed Speed Limit Zones" unless such vessel is being operated within such area for the purpose of enabling a person engaged in water skiing to take off or land.

Section 3. Regulation of Vessels Towing an Item or Person. Any motorized vessel towing an item or person must stay a minimum of 200 feet from any shoreline, dock, float, or an anchored vessel unless leaving or returning to a launching or docking area.

Section 4. Regulation of Berthing or Recreating. No motorized vessel shall, anchor, moor, or recreate on the waters of Loon Lake within 100 feet of a dock or swim platform.

Section 5. Penalties. Any person who violates any provision of this Local Law shall be deemed guilty of a violation and, upon conviction thereof, shall be fined an amount not exceeding one hundred dollars (\$100) for the first violation and not exceeding five hundred dollars (\$500) for each subsequent violation.

Section 6. Supersession. This Local Law is specifically intended to supersede Town of Chester Local Law No. 1 of 2011.

Section 7. Severability. If any part of this Local Law is declared invalid by a Court of competent jurisdiction, such declaration shall not affect or impair in any way any other provision and all other provisions shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 8. Effective Date. This Local Law shall take effect upon filing in the office of the New York Secretary of State as provided by Section 27 of the Municipal Home Rule Law.

Supervisor Leggett asked John Nick, President of the Loon Lake Park District Association how it looked.

John Nick asked if there were going to be changes made to the 1996 Law for jets skis like they recommended.

Mark Schachner commented that he had not received any recommendation about jet skis. If the Board would like to change the 1996 as well maybe there should be one new Local Law. Mr. Schachner said that they could write a new Local Law that incorporates both Laws into one or make two separate amended Local Laws.

Mr. Turcotte asked if we could have one Law so you only have to look in one place.

Mr. Schachner will write another draft Local Law for the public hearing.

Mr. Turcotte asked if the Local Law could be for the waters of Town of Chester.

Mr. Schachner commented that part of Schroon Lake is in the Town of Chester and Friends Lake has no public access.

RESOLUTION NO. 34 OF 2021: SET PUBLIC HEARING FOR THE PROPOSED LOCAL LAW

WHEREAS, discussions between the Town Board and the Loon Lake Park District Association have resulted in several recommendations that will improve the safety and enjoyment of Loon Lake,

BE IT RESOLVED, the Town Board authorizes the Town Clerk to advertise for a public hearing and sets a public hearing for the Proposed Local Law Regulating the Vessels on Loon Lake to be held on Tuesday, March 9, 2021 at 7 pm.

Loon Lake Launch Fees:

Supervisor Leggett presented a proposed Launch Fee Structure, Policy and Procedures for the Loon Lake Boat Launch:

POLICY

- All watercraft being launched and retrieved at the Loon Lake Boat Launch shall be inspected by Boat Launch Attendants for aquatic invasive species
- Any boats being deemed contaminated shall be decontaminated before being launched. Contaminated boats being retrieved from the Loon Lake may be decontaminated before leaving the Boat Launch area
- All watercraft shall have paid the appropriate fee before launching
- Aquatic Invasive Species inspection and decontamination shall be provided for no fee regardless if the boat is to be launched at or retrieved from the Loon Lake Boat Launch
- Boat Launch Attendants have the authority and ability to collect Launch Fees and issue a form of receipt to the user

PROCEDURES

- Boat Launch Attendants shall carry out aquatic invasive species inspections on all watercraft before launching and after retrieving
- Boat Launch Attendants shall decontaminate all contaminated watercraft before the vessel is allowed to launch into Loon Lake
- Boat Launch Attendants shall have a cash box with sufficient funds (“bank”) to make change throughout a typical day of operation. Attendants shall verify the opening and closing balance of the cash box at the beginning and ending of their shift and shall note it on record sheets provided by the Town
- Deposits of cash in excess of the standard cash box bank shall be made at least each Thursday or more often if the excess over the bank is more than \$100. Deposits will be given to the Town Clerk for handling and recording
- A Boat Launch User will receive a numbered ticket when they pay the appropriate fee. The Attendant shall mark down the number of each ticket sold on a record sheet provided by the Town. There will be separate sets of tickets for General Public, LLPD Property Owner, and Season Ticket with their own numbering sequence.

John Nick said that he has lake property owners comment that it should be free for them and John has told them that the Supervisor has committed that the money will go to the Lake. John said once he said that all resistance was gone.

Supervisor Leggett asked the Attorney for the Town if the Board accepts the policy and procedures in a resolution then a resolution would be necessary to change them. Mr. Schachner replied that that was correct.

Mrs. DuRose commented that the Town will really have to advertise the fee schedule.

RESOLUTION NO. 35 OF 2021: ACCEPT THE LOON LAKE BOAT LAUNCH FEE SCHEDULE

WHEREAS, the Town of Chester operates a public Boat Launch on Loon Lake, and
WHEREAS, the Loon Lake Boat Launch is staffed 7 days a week from mid May to mid October in order to carry out aquatic invasive plant inspections, boat decontamination, and management of launching and retrieval of water craft, and
WHEREAS, the cost of operations for the Loon Lake Boat Launch are supported by the Town General Fund and the Loon Lake Park District through taxation, and
WHEREAS, the Town Board deems it appropriate to charge a use fee for persons utilizing the services of the Loon Lake Boat Launch in order to offset the costs of operations, and a use fee is endorsed by the Loon Lake Park District Association,
BE IT RESOLVED, the Town Board sets forth the following user fee to begin May of 2021:

WHEREAS, the Zoning Administrator already has those duties and powers, as found in the job description and in parts of the said Local Laws, and in the past the Zoning Administrator has fulfilled those duties,

BE IT RESOLVED, the Town Board hereby confirms that the Zoning Administrator has authority to enforce compliance with the Town of Chester Zoning Local Law and Property Maintenance Local Law.

Transfer Station Fees:

Mr. Packer recommended raising the fees.

Mr. Turcotte said that Craig and he worked on the cost of tires. Craig said when they have a big pile of tires they will call for a pick up. Mr. Turcotte said they have to be careful of truck tires.

Mr. Turcotte would like to track what is taken in before they adjust the rates. This way the Town will know what is in the bins before they go out.
